I have a dream that one day even the state of Mississippi, a state sweltering with the heat of injustice, sweltering with the heat of oppression, will be transformed into an oasis of freedom and justice." The ability to effectively communicate is a skill that is absolutely necessary as a leader but there is one more that truly inspires followers.

Selflessness – the concern of others' needs and wishes more than one's own – is the ultimate inspiration. Martin Luther King Jr. was especially known for this amazing trait as he was one to always put others before himself. For years he worked with anti-poverty activists to not only help African Americans but also other minorities like Hispanics and disadvantaged

whites. He also chose to take the non-violent approach against the civil injustices faced by African Americans knowing it was the harder route to take. One of his most famous quotes, "Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that" exemplifies this selfless nature of his.
